LIVESTRONG BRACELET: TO WEAR OR NOT TO WEAR?

- 1 Lou Hablas has supported Livestrong for years and worn the iconic yellow bracelet in honor of those people who have lost loved ones to cancer. He also has volunteered for the cancer charity as a photographer to raise money for Livestrong's programs.
- 5 Hablas says he'll continue to wear the bracelet despite news that embattled cyclist Lance Armstrong is stepping down as chairman of the charity he founded 15 years ago. But the poster of Armstrong leading his Discovery teammates in 2005 is coming down from his office wall amid news that the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency found "overwhelming" evidence of Armstrong's involvement in doping as a professional cyclist.
- 11 Like many who admired the cyclist and cancer research advocate, Hablas is attempting to reconcile images of Armstrong as a fallen hero and a cancer survivor who used his stardom to dramatically change the stigma attached to the disease.
- 15 Others, like Paul Smeulders, who saw Armstrong as a symbol of hope and solidarity were completely devastated by his fall, with some cynically wondering if Livestrong was a front to deflect attention from doping allegations. "It appeared he started using Livestrong as a brand to elevate himself and as a shield to cover or dodge criticism of his unsportsmanlike behavior", Smeulders said.

**THE FOREIGN-BORN ARE MORE SUCCESSFUL IN
BRITAIN THAN IN MOST PLACES**

1 Polls repeatedly show that Britons are unhappier about immigration than most
people, especially after a decade of record inflows. Britain's foreign-born population
includes a higher proportion of people with tertiary education than in almost any other
OECD country. Incomers are much more likely to be highly educated than native Brits.
5 This is thanks in part to the small number of Americans and others who flocked to the
City before the financial crisis. It also reflects a flood of well-qualified east Europeans
from 2004 and a growing number of clever Asians and so forth who come to study and
stay to work.

10 Predictably, they have found jobs –many of them good ones. The proportion of
employed foreign-born men in Britain was above the OECD average in 2009-10.
Though around a fifth of people in migrant households figure in the poorest tenth of the
population, 8.5% are in the richest tenth, well above the norm. The picture is more
mixed for their children. Most do well in school, often beating the offspring of native
English-speakers. More children of foreign-born parents complete tertiary education.

15 Overall, though, Britain's immigrants are a success story, especially compared with
other European countries. One reason is that many have come to work or study, fewer to
join family or escape persecution. They are motivated to stand on their own feet and
18 usually have, or quickly gain, the skills to do so.

A GAP YEAR

- 1 A gap year is a period of time when students take a break from formal education to travel, volunteer, study, intern, or work. A gap year experience can last for several weeks up to a year or more. Typically a gap year is taken between high school graduation and starting college, during college, or between college and starting graduate school or a career.
- 6 The gap year is becoming increasingly popular with US students. One reason is that parents are more open to the idea nowadays. Studies conclusively show that students who take a year out before college are more focused and motivated when they arrive on campus than those who don't take this detour. Harvard's admissions department is so convinced of the benefits of a gap year that they offer the option to every admitted freshman in their acceptance letter.
- 12 Taking time out between high school and college used to evoke fear that the student would not follow through with college. Today, the college admissions offices at universities are getting more requests from students who have previously enjoyed a gap year. This trend is great news for both colleges, students and parents. Given the fact that the dropout rate amongst US college freshman is nearly 30 percent, the gap year option is fast becoming a viable alternative for many students.

WHAT IS LAUGHTER THERAPY?

- 1 Ramsey Campbell once spoke to the BBC about people's fear of clowns, which he believes is due to a clown's unchanging mask of forced comicality. Yet advocates of laughter therapy believe that laughing is what helps us rid ourselves of our own masks of fear and pain. From workplaces to therapists' offices to hospitals, laughter coaches aim to get people laughing in an effort to get them to be their best selves. By laughing, the theory goes, you're able to keep your cool in a stressful work situation, make peace with the hurt and pain in your past or deal with the stress of a serious illness. That doesn't mean miserable days are completely gone. Laughter therapy can't take the place of conventional therapies entirely, but there is increasing evidence that a few hearty laughs can help you along the road to recovery. Laughter is believed to be beneficial to patients because it reduces anxiety and stress, renders pain manageable and bolsters the immune system. Yet humor is highly subjective -what gives one person the giggles might just as easily put another to sleep. Part of laughter therapy is figuring out exactly what stimulates your funny bone, so that getting some healing laughs can be just as easy as popping in a DVD.

ITALIANO? “NEIN”: A PART OF ITALY WANTS OUT

1 In Italy's Alps, at the border with Austria, there's a land where people speak in German and dream of independence. Once part of the Austro-Hungarian empire, it was annexed by Italy at the end of World War I. But even today, not a single drop of Italian blood runs through the veins of its more than 500,000 inhabitants. They feel and simply
5 are still Austro-German. If a Napolitan or Roman, but even a Florentine, pops up asking for directions, they'll look at him in a funny way trying to grasp what he's saying and might reluctantly reply in Italian with a pronounced German accent.

THE SECRET LIFE OF PASSWORDS

1 We despise them –yet we imbue them with our hopes and dreams, our dearest memories, our deepest meanings. They unlock much more than our accounts. In our authorship of passwords, in the fact that we construct them so that we (and only we) will remember them, they take on secret lives.

5 Often they have rich back stories. A motivational mantra, a criticism at the boss, a hidden shrine to a lost love, an inside joke with ourselves, a defining emotional scar — these keepsake passwords, as some people call them, may derive from anything: horoscopes, nicknames, lyrics, book passages. Sometimes the passwords are playful, but they can also memorialize loss or mark painful turning points: a college student, trapped for several years in a relationship with a physically abusive boyfriend who routinely spied on her email, used for her new password the date of her decision to break up with him plus the word ‘freedom’.

15 Douglas R. Hofstader, professor of cognitive science at Indiana University thinks that many passwords are silent celebrations of things we hold dear. His primary password, he says, is the same one he has employed since 1975, when he was a visiting scholar at Stanford.

**BRUSHING OFF A FRENCH STIGMA
THAT DOGGIE BAGS ARE FOR BEGGARS**

1 Fabrice Moya, a restaurant chef, has no problems with doggie bags. 'We've always been used to letting people take what they haven't finished,' he said on a recent morning in his kitchen, where several of his cooks were chopping carrots and filling buckets with chickpeas for the day's lunch
5 service. But it rarely happens -one doggie bag per week at most, out of 500 customers, he estimated. That is not to say nothing is ever left behind. Though the French remain resistant to taking leftovers home, a small movement is afoot to change attitudes. It has been encouraged by difficult economic times, rising consciousness about food waste, and an environmentally minded
10 younger generation that is more familiar with takeout culture. As part of a wider drive to cut down on food waste, the authorities in Lyon started a campaign last month to promote the use of doggie bags in local restaurants. Still, there is a long way to go to overcome French prejudices about taking home leftovers. Dining out is thus a rare experience, to be enjoyed in situ, not
15 bundled up in plastic foam containers and reheated in the microwave. Indeed, finishing one's plate is something of a French institution.

IS MOLECULAR GASTRONOMY SAFE?

1 When people hear the words molecular gastronomy for the first time they often
mistakenly view it as unhealthy, synthetic, dehumanizing and unnatural. This is not
surprising given that molecular gastronomy often relies on fuming flasks of liquid
nitrogen, led-blinking water baths, syringes, PH meters and shelves of food chemicals
5 with strange names. My wife's first reaction when I surprised her with a liquid pea
spherical raviolo was to say "Can I eat this? Is this safe?" The truth is that the chemicals
used in molecular gastronomy are all of biological origin. Even though they have been
purified or processed, the raw material origin is usually marine, plant, animal or
microbial. These additives have been approved by EU standards and are used in very
10 small amounts. The science lab instruments used just help modern gastronomy cooks to
do simple things like cooling food at extremely low temperatures fast (liquid nitrogen)
or extract flavour from food (evaporator). There is still some debate out there about the
healthiness of molecular gastronomy but I personally believe there are far bigger health
issues in the everyday food we consume. In the end, you are not going to be eating
15 liquid pea spheres every day anyway.

PIRATES FACE A NEW FOE: A PRIVATE NAVY

1 Times are tough and getting worse for Somali pirates, as their targets take countermeasures. The number of attacks off the Horn of Africa tumbled from 236 in 2011 to no more than 72 in 2012, according to the International Maritime Bureau, a body that monitors crime at sea. Now a private naval effort is adding to their woes. A
5 company called *Typhon* will use a 10,000 tonne "mother ship" to accompany convoys of merchant vessels. With 60 mostly armed, mostly British ex-soldiers on board, it will deploy speedboats and unmanned drones to watch and intercept hostile boats. - 1 The overwhelming consensus among climate scientists is that human-caused climate change is happening. Yet a fringe minority of our populace clings to an irrational rejection of well-established science. SPEAKING MORE THAN ONE LANGUAGE COULD SHARPEN YOUR BRAIN

1 A recent study found that bilingual speakers may actually process information more efficiently than single-language speakers. Researchers used brain imaging to look at bilingual people's comprehension abilities and they found that they are comparatively better at filtering out unnecessary words than monolinguals, who had to work harder to
5 complete the same mental tasks.

The researchers studied 17 Spanish-English bilinguals and 18 monolinguals, and had them undergo tests that assessed their brains' ability to eliminate irrelevant words. In one task the participants heard the word *cloud* and were then immediately shown four pictures. One of the photos was of a cloud, and another was a similar-sounding word like
10 *clown*. The goal was to watch how quickly the brain could make connections to the correct word. Bilinguals were consistently better at the task.

The results create a bit of a chicken-or-the-egg scenario. Is a bilingual person better at such tasks because of their expertise in both languages, or are people with greater comprehension capacity better equipped to master multiple languages? It could be a
15 mixture of the two. The researchers of this study believe that being bilingual is a constant brain exercise. So instead of tackling a puzzle, why not give a new language a try?

1 A pity you can't ask a dog for the shortest route home when you're lost –or a cat or a seabird or a tortoise. They know a lot more than you think. It is amazing how nonhumans manage to find their way, often over very great distances. Recently a dog walked eleven miles to return home. It was especially praiseworthy because the dog had 5 been taken to its new location by car and found its way back on foot.

The kind of natural map any animal follows depends largely upon the species. Seabirds are believed to steer mostly by the sun and the stars. Other animals navigate via magnetism –in one study on baby sea turtles, which typically migrate east just after being born, changing the orientation of magnetic generators around a swimming pool 10 changed the direction in which the new-borns swam too.

Dogs, no surprise, are very good on scent. Cats might rely more on magnetic fields. The overall temperament can play a role in navigation too. A dog that travels a great distance to get home may be trying to return to its owner; a cat travelling the same distance is –sorry, cat owners- very probably trying to return to its territory.

- 1 *Candy Crush Saga* is a match-three puzzle video game released on April 12, 2012 for Facebook. Different 'special candies' can be formed by matching a combination of 4 or 5 in a certain formation, such as a 'Striped' candy (which clears either an entire row or column), a 'Wrapped' candy (which acts like a bomb; clearing the 8 surrounding candies, falling, and exploding one more time), or a 'Color Bomb' (which removes all candies with the same color of the one it is matched with). Special Candies can also be matched together, producing varying effects; for example, matching a color bomb with a striped candy turns all of the candies of its color into striped candies, which are immediately detonated.
- 10 Once all levels in an episode are completed, the next episode is locked and the player must either get three friends on Facebook to send them 'tickets' to unlock the next episode, or occasionally the game will allow the player to move on for free if the player has not been able to clear the next area. If the game is not linked to the player's Facebook account, a new level can be accessed by playing a Mystery Quest, a random 15 previous level with a higher point threshold for winning.

- 1 Quick-thinking Susan Brown, 59, witnessed the prolonged attack in Cleethorpes, on her way to her relative's house. She put her foot down to drive at the gang of seven thugs, causing them to disperse. Ms Brown's actions prevented further violence from continuing and she then rang 999.

- 10 Crime scene investigators spent several hours combing the area and taking fingerprints from the car of the woman who broke up the attack.
- 15 Humberside Police arrested three men after the attack on suspicion of assault. A spokeswoman for the force said: 'Officers are currently on the scene working to establish the circumstances of the incident'.

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OPTION B

INCREASED INEQUALITY

- 1 According to figures released by the International Monetary Fund (IMF), the top 20% of Spanish society earns nearly seven and a half times more than the bottom 20%. This puts Spain third on the list of EU countries where the wealthy take a bigger piece of the pie.
- 5 “As a result of the crisis, social indicators deteriorated sharply,” reads the IMF’s annual report on the Spanish economy. The report analyses the consequences of the crisis on income distribution, warning that although a fast pace of job creation has helped reduce them, the benefits of the recovery are being unevenly shared among different generations and different education levels: “Job losses affected
- 10 disproportionately low-educated/low wage workers, youth, and immigrants, particularly working in the construction sector under temporary contracts (...) The number of people at risk of poverty or social exclusion increased by more than 23 percent between 2007 and 2015 in Spain.”
- The IMF recommends implementing policies to improve “the employability of young
- 15 and low-skilled workers” as a “policy priority to reduce risks of social exclusion among vulnerable groups.” The increase in inequality, the study suggests, is not so much due to higher income among the top earners as to the poor situation at the bottom of the economic ladder.
